Building a Kingdom

ne of things I've been doing since I retired is researching my family tree. I enjoy matching old photographs with the names of family ancestors. It's also fascinating to link names with family heirlooms like an old Bible inscribed with my great grandmother's name dated 1898 and her mother's pocket watch from 1878. It's especially interesting, and often inspiring, when I discover the life stories of ancestors who were pioneers and endured various hardships. It reminds me that my family tree is not just a list of names and dates, but real people who lived real lives, and had life stories.

Recently, as I was reading through 1 Chronicles, I came across a woman named Sheerah whose life story in the Bible is often overlooked. In fact, I nearly missed it myself as she is mentioned in just one verse nestled in Israel's genealogy. Since she was a woman in a long list of men's names, her significance intrigued me. It made me wonder what was so important about her that gave her the honor of being mentioned in God's Word.

"His daughter was Sheerah, who built Lower and Upper Beth Horon as well as Uzzen Sheerah." 1 Chronicles 7:24

Apparently Sheerah was a descendant of Ephraim, the son of Joseph. Her name means: to remain; be a remnant; to be a small but perpetually surviving portion of a family. After a tragic incident where most of Ephraim's family members were killed, Sheerah's birth brought hope and renewal to the family.

We don't know what motivated her, but her brief story shows that she became an instrument of God to build, or re-build, three fortified cities: Lower and Upper Beth Horon, and Uzzen Sheerah.

The twin cities of Beth Horon were used by Joshua in his military campaigns and later King Solomon fortified them, further emphasizing their importance in the region. The third city, Uzzen-Sheerah, was named after herself and means, "portion of Sheerah". Sheerah's faith, determination and leadership

were instrumental in constructing these cities that would benefit future generations.

It's a reminder that despite our past, present, or future circumstances, God has a plan for each of us. When Donna Robart followed God's leading and direction to start the Women's Refuge, she could not have envisioned the thousands of women and their families who would be the impacted by its ministry. Through the Refuge's residential program, women experience a loving, structured, family-like environment where they can heal emotionally and spiritually, grow in their faith, and acquire new relational and life skills.

One woman shared with me that twenty years ago she came to the Refuge from an abusive background and was very confused about her identity and future. Today she and her husband have four children and are serving God on the mission field. She is passing on to their children, and those she ministers to, the things she learned at the Refuge. There are countless stories of women whose lives, and those of their families, were transformed through the power of Christ at the Women's Refuge.

We all have a life story and God has a plan for it. No mater how your story began, even if you think you are just a small remnant or a barely surviving portion of a family, begin to build for the Kingdom. Like Sheerah and Donna, build in such a way that when you or your family come under siege, God will be your place of Refuge.

"He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus." (Phil. 1:6).
