

April 2021 SUFFERING, GROANING & REDEMPTION

"... because the creation itself also will be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God." Romans 8:21

On a recent Tuesday morning devotion, I gave the above scripture to the women in the program and asked them if they understood what it meant. They had an idea so we launched into a discussion about Romans 8:18-23. In Romans 8 the apostle Paul used the word groan a total of three times and tells us that both the creation and the children of God are groaning while we wait for our redemption. Groaning can be defined as a deep inward response to suffering. So, why are we suffering? Because of the corruption that curses us as the result of the original disobedience and rebellion of mankind.

I asked the ladies to look around them and share examples of corruption in the meditation garden where we were meeting. They saw dead trees, plants, leaves and lots of weeds and then went on to mention tornadoes, hurricanes, ice storms and other catastrophes of nature. But, alas! We are not going to focus on the groaning; we have redemption coming. Both mankind and the creation will be delivered from the bondage of corruption as we "eagerly await for the adoption, the redemption of our body" (vs 23).

This groaning and laboring is universal like birth pangs (vs 22). It hurts, but oh the joy when the delivery is complete! That is what we and the creation look forward to—the redemption from all the suffering into His glorious liberty. Paul goes on to say that "nothing will separate us from the love of Christ (vs 35). No tribulation, no distress, no persecution, no famine, no nakedness, no peril, no sword.

So, while we wait for this redemption, we continue to take

care of this fallen creation and our fallen bodies. Then Solomon tells us in Ecclesiastes 3 that God "has put eternity in our hearts" (vs 11) and "that every man should eat, drink and enjoy the good of all his labor—it is the gift of God" (vs 13).

That's why I can enjoy working outdoors and the ladies that help me can see purpose in what we're doing.

In our fallen world, the labor will never stop but Jesus says, "Look up, your redemption is drawing near".
